
CALL TO WORSHIP YOUTH GROUP

# ADULT EDUCATION NOVEMBER 5 THROUGH DECEMBER 17, 2023

#### INTRODUCTION TO THE REFORMED FAITH (SANCTUARY)

This class provides a basic orientation to the Reformed tradition that guides our church's teaching and its ministries. It offers a brief history of the origin and development of Reformed churches, including Presbyterian churches, before reviewing two of the most important Reformed statements of faith (Heidelberg Catechism, Westminster Confession). It explains why Reformed churches focus on "covenant" as a key to understanding the Scriptures. It also introduces central Reformed teachings about the person and work of Christ, salvation, Christian living, and life in the world.

**Mark Noll** is retired as a history professor, first from Wheaton College and then the University of Notre Dame. He and his wife, Maggie, have been privileged to be part of this congregation for more than four decades.

### NEW TESTAMENT WITNESSES TO CHRIST (MINISTRY HOUSE)

Jesus told his followers, "You shall be my witnesses." We want to be—we know we should be—but what does it mean practically to be a witness for Jesus? In this class we will observe and learn from various New Testament witnesses who can encourage us in our way of communicating our faith in our present context.

# The Luther Rose

The pulpit banner before you is a recreation of the seal that Martin Luther designed for his personal coat of arms.

Luther, a priest and professor in Wittenberg, Germany, had come to believe, through his study of the Psalms and Paul's Epistles, that salvation came from faith in Christ alone, a free gift. When a Catholic official came into Luther's region selling indulgences (purchasing penance for sin with money), Luther was outraged. He nailed the Ninety-Five Theses (protesting this matter and others) to the church door on October 31, 1517—the event we celebrate today as Reformation Sunday. The devotion of Luther, John Calvin, and others to the authority of Scripture, salvation through faith, and the individual's access to God through Christ led to a separation from the Roman Catholic Church and the beginning of Protestantism.

In Luther's seal, the cross is black to represent the mortification Christ suffered for us, and the heart red for his shed blood. The white Messianic rose symbolized the joy of faith. The blue background represents the joy of heaven, and the ring of gold stands for eternal blessedness in Christ.
